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## ART, LINES

Another new art space is really something more than that; it's a reading-listening room and a place to educate the mind and ear that happens to have started showing art.

Nonsequitur is the business housing this eclectic amalgamation. Nonsequitur is a nonprofit mail-order business that ships experimental music and books internationally. The outfit, headed by Steve Peters, moved into its new digs at 317 Fifth SW this December. The one-time print shop is between Lead and Silver.

Peters had some nice, high ceilinged walls that were crying out for something. That something became art and Elodie Lauten is the first to hang her works there. Nonsequitur is not a gallery per se, but it has something synergistic going for it — the music, image combo — that galleries don't. What it needs is viewer-friendly lighting.

Lauten is a new music composer and multimedia artist who recently moved to Albuquerque from New York. She's studied with famed minimalist composer LaMonte Young, Her imagery, graphic scores from her composition "The Gaia Cycle: Music in Twelve Kevs." is intricate. Mandalas and modal sequences create motion in these works on paper. In the scores, a rhythm of symbol and spiritual is stirred. But, for me, that sense of movement was held to the surface of the paper; I wasn't moved.

You can see Lauten's work at Nonsequitur from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays. This Friday at 8 p.m. she will perform in concert "The Gaia Cycle" at the Outpost Performance Space, 112 Morningside SE. Nonsequitur has tentatively planned more shows for the space including works by David Dunn.
